Message from The Principal

here has the time gone? It only seems like yesterday I was welcoming you back in September, very glad to not be having to test students for Covid-19 or talk

about isolation periods, and now here we are, in the blink of an eye, at Christmas. We even had some seasonal weather over the weekend in parts of Telford to help us feel even more festive!

All I can say is wow, what a term! We are certainly back up and running and making up for lost time post-covid with everything that makes Charlton a special place to come to school. I genuinely do not know how the staff find the time over and above their day jobs to provide so many opportunities for our students. I love to look through our newsletters and be reminded of all the opportunities our students have had, as I tell them frequently, Charlton is far more than just the five one-hour daily lessons.

We have been visited by many external organisations this term, including a full school review from the Learning Community Trust and a visit from our Behaviour Hubs partner school. All our visitors were full of praise for what they saw and heard from our students about our school. The students should rightly be proud of everything they have achieved this term. We are delighted with the progress the school continues to make.

You will be aware that earlier in the term a serious medical incident occurred on our site involving one of our students. The swift actions of our staff prior to the prompt arrival of the emergency services helped to achieve our own Christmas miracle and we are delighted to have the student back in school again already. Her family have expressed their gratitude for all of the well wishes and were comforted knowing the whole school community were thinking of them, in the most challenging circumstances for them.

Merry Christmas from the History Department



his year, 2022, has been an exciting year of trips for our KS4 students—something we have welcomed since the disruption of Covid-19.

Our current Year IIs enjoyed a residential trip to London in February, and in July this year went to explore historical sites relevant to their GCSE History course. We visited the Imperial War Museum, where we focused upon the Western Front element of our Paper I Medicine topic. We also visited the Tower of London and Hampton Court for our Henry VIII and his Ministers Paper 2 course. We then enjoyed visiting tourist attractions around the capital and a 'Jack the Ripper' walking tour in the evening. The trip was a huge success and has enabled us, along with the restrictions being eased, to facilitate more historical trips in 2023.

We plan to send out letters in the new year to launch our KS3 trip to the Black Country Living Museum, as well as visiting Ironbridge and Coalbrookdale, as a local industrial site comparison. This links to our Industrial Revolution topic in the Summer term.

We also hope to have a historical workshop in school for our Year 9 students to introduce the new breadth topic of Medicine Through Time, with a focus on medicine during the First World War on the Western Front. We plan to run this workshop in the Spring term, with external historians leading the session. There has been some great work completed in the History department this term

Last—but certainly not least—we hope to run another KS4 trip for Year 10 students to attend an overnight

residential to either London again, or overseas to Berlin for our Paper 2 Cold War topic and Paper 3 Weimar and Nazi Germany topic. Students have recently been sent an email to register their interest for one of these trips and the one with the most interest will take place in Summer/Autumn 2023.

There has been some great work completed in the History department this term. We wish to make a special mention to our Year 7 cohort for their beautiful Saxon shields for their project. Also a big 'well done' to Year 11 for their efforts in the mock exams. As a department, we are really pleased with the level of focus they showed—although we hope attendance at revision sessions will improve in the New Year.

I would like to finish off by thanking the staff in the department for their hard work and wishing Mr Redman well, who is leaving us at Christmas, for a promotion elsewhere. I, Mrs Groves, will be back for a short time in January before going on maternity leave until December to have my first baby.

Thank you to parents, carers, guardians, and pupils for all your hard work this year and for your continued focus and support in the New Year.

Careers News

Cornerstone Enterprise Challenge Winners Pay

Year 8 winners of the Wrekin Housing Trust attended a work experience day at their head office. During the day, the students participated in a budgeting exercise where they had to furnish a onebedroom apartment within the budget given. Surprisingly, they had a clear focus on the essentials and not the Playstation! Following this, they participated in a prioritising activity, thinking about what neighbourhoods require to function. Most of the students believed that capturing stray dogs would be the top priority rather than collecting rubbish.

Further opportunities explored were 'theatre chef', where an amazing chef prepared pancakes and fruit salad; a tour of the building; and a 'guess my job' panel where different employees came and explained their jobs and the students had to guess the job titles.

Overall, the students had a great day, there was lots of excited chatter on the way home about the activities they experienced.

Curriculum Enhancement Pay

What a busy day! Year 11 were given the opportunity to meet colleges, sixth forms, training providers, and apprenticeships providers. Students were informed about the different courses available to them including the new T Levels.

Year 10 had the opportunity to talk to Telford College and County training about post-16 opportunities.

Alongside this, most year groups participated in virtual presentations from Veolia and 4schools. Veolia explored green careers, apprenticeships, and the growth of Veolia. 4schools is a new initiative through Channel 4 informing students about careers in media. Both opportunities included a Q&A session. Luckily for us, our students asked lots of questions which made the sessions most informative and interesting.

Pathways Evening

Our annual Pathways event took place on Tuesday 15th November with a host of providers in attendance to discuss post-16 and post-18 options with our parents and students. The school was a buzz of activity as years 9, 10 and 11 turned up to have those all-important conversations.

Army Challenge Vay

A group of year 9 students visited Parson's Barracks, Donnington to experience the day in the life of an Army soldier. The day was split into six onehour long sessions to ensure that the students experienced as much as possible.

Participating in a range of activities from assault courses to rope work, the students got stuck in. They explored a military police van, pulled a canon, and carried out first aid at a staged accident.

Each student was given a goodie bag which included a t-shirt, water bottle and mug.

Lunch consisted of Army issue ration packs!

World of Work Pay

A 'World of Work' day for Year 9 students was held recently where they met a range of local employers as part of their career

curriculum. Discussions with employers explored different pathways and what each job entailed. Further information was given to explain T routes and univer

T Levels

This year has seen the introduction of Technical Levels. The aim of these is to provide students with 20% work experience as part of their course. Equivalent to A Levels, these courses provide the skills needed for employment in the designated sectors. Our local colleges have been into school to explain them to our students. 


















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SMOKE ALARMS SAVE SAVE LIVES

We will require you as parents/carers to consent to any work we undertake if the young person is under the age of 16.

Who are 'CATE' and what do we do?

- A small team within the local Council
- Committed to identifying and working with young people who are at risk of Child Sexual Exploitation
- We build positive and trusting relationships to increase awareness and reduce the risk of CSE
- Working in partnership with all relevant agencies; Police, Safeguarding, Education, Health Services, Social Services and Voluntary Sector
- Offer one to one support delivering the CATE intervention pack covering 6 themes: 'What is CSE?', 'Healthy Relationships', 'Understanding Grooming', 'Internet Safety', 'Sex and the law', 'Peer pressure'
- Supporting young people to access other services/agencies as appropriate

What is Child Sexual Exploitation?

"Child sexual exploitation is a form of sexual abuse in which a child or young person is exploited, coerced and/or manipulated into engaging in some form of sexual activity in return for something they need or desire and/or for the gain of a third person.

The 'something' received by the child can include both tangible items such as food, somewhere to stay, drugs, alcohol, cigarettes or money and more intangible 'rewards' such as perceived affection, protection or a sense of belonging. Fear of what might happen if they do not comply can also be a significant influencing factor.

Common to all these scenarios is an imbalance of power in favour of the abuser and some degree of coercion, intimidation, exploitation, violence and/or enticement of the child or young person." (DSCF 2009)

The abuse can be perpetrated by groups or individuals, and by adults or peers.
