On the morning of Friday 28th January, while on their way to school, some of our students (above, with Steve Tyler, PCSO) came across an elderly lady who had fallen over and was unable to get herself up. This resulted in her being on the ground overnight and becoming hypothermic. The students helped the lady to get up off the wet, cold ground and called her an ambulance. They offered her reassurance and basic first aid until a qualified first aider arrived.

This was the first aid work the students had ever done. They drew on their personal development lessons at school which helped them to assess the situation and get the lady into a safe position. They then called for an ambulance and made sure she was in safe hands before continuing their journey to school to sit an English mock exam!

Andrew McNaughton, Charlton School Principal said, "As a school, we are tremendously proud of these Y11 students and the care they gave a member of our community. They demonstrated their strength of character and proved themselves to be responsible young adults." The students all received a commendation letter from the Principal and a phone call home from PCSO Steve to show how impressed the school had been with their potentially lifesaving actions. "It's great to see our students out and about doing good deeds in the community," Steve said, "These students deserved some recognition for their work as active, responsible citizens."

#### **Maths Challenge**

This term has seen some of our talented mathematicians in Years 7 to 10 take part in the University of Leeds Maths Challenge. Students in Year 7 and 8 sat the Junior Challenge and Year 9 and 10 sat the next level of Intermediate. This is a national challenge with the majority of secondary schools in the country taking part. The students sit a one hour exam that requires them to solve mathematical problems by logic and reason. All of our students were recognised for their endeavours with 44 receiving Bronze awards and 14 receiving Silver. James Atwell of Year 7 and Zeeshan Hussain in Year 10 both received Gold Awards. A special mention for the following students who qualified for the next

#### **Historians Visit London**

The Rights Respecting Schools Award puts children's rights at the heart of schools in the UK.

The UK Committee for UNICEF (UNICEF UK) works with schools in the UK to create safe and inspiring places to learn, where children are respected, their talents are nurtured, and they are able to thrive. Our Rights Respecting Schools Award embeds these values in daily school life and gives children the best chance to lead happy, healthy lives and to be responsible, active citizens.

Using the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC) as our guide, we are working with more UK schools than almost any other organisation. Over 1.6 million children in the UK go to a Rights Respecting School and nearly 5,000 schools up and down the country are working through the Award. Schools work with us on a journey to become fully Rights Respecting.



The Award recognises a school's achievement in putting the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child into practice within the school and beyond.

We have successfully achieved the Bronze Award: Rights Committed, we are now working towards achieving Silver: Rights Aware.

#### Charlton students help open UK's first off-grid bus station

The UK's first bus station to generate its own electricity was officially opened in Wellington recently.

The new bus station will further reduce the carbon footprint of the borough and meet Telford & Wrekin Council's ambitious target for net zero by 2030.

The council has worked with suppliers Etesian Green and Journeo to create the 'off-grid' station where power is generated by multidirectional wind turbines and solar panels producing renewable, carbonfree energy. Energy available day and night will be harnessed, with each individual shelter generating approximately 820 kilowatt-hours a year, enough electricity to supply a house for three months.

This energy will power the lighting, CCTV and live timetable information boards in the shelters. Every shelter is constructed using hundreds of recycled plastic bottles. The shelter roofs are also put to work thanks to a low-growing plant called 'sedum', giving back to nature with pockets of urban wilderness, providing a home for insects and bees and absorbing carbon.

Over the lifespan of the bus station, carbon savings of 55 tonnes will be achieved, the same as planting more than 750 new trees. It's not just energy saving measures that have been incorporated into the station; the passenger information technology includes improved accessibility and security features such as voice and push button announcements.

Councillor Carolyn Healy (Labour), Cabinet Member for Climate Change, Green Spaces, Natural and



Historic Environment and Cultural Services said, "The bus shelters are another step forward in our green journey to help tackle the climate emergency. We are pioneering the installation of smart shelters powered by solar panels and micro wind turbine technology and were one of the first in the region to welcome bus stops with living roofs - clear examples of how we're actively embedding renewable technology and bringing it to life – helping improve the borough's climate, biodiversity and air quality. The work continues well into the future as for every micro turbine installed, our contractor Etesian Green will plant 10 trees." Technical Director Ben Fagg at Etesian Green said, "Etesian Green is a collaboration of companies formed to deliver next generation renewable solutions to the 'out of home' and outdoor network environments.

Our vision is to accelerate the UK's clean energy transition through the use of our innovative wind and solar technologies at a local level. We

envision bus shelters and stations, streets, car parks, coastlines, business parks, city centres, and remote and residential areas all benefiting from its service. With the ability to be on and off grid we are looking to support EV charging schemes and in partnership with 21st also seeking to provide key statistical data on energy savings, air quality, wind speeds and temperatures. We stand on the threshold of a new, greener, and more resilient era. Together we hold extraordinary power in our hands."

A further £250,000k is being invested over the next two years with more eco bus shelters being rolled out in support of Telford & Wrekin Council's bid to make the borough cleaner, greener and safer.

## Wrekin Rowers Complete Atlantic Ocean challenge

Four rowers have completed a 3,000-mile (4,800 km) challenge of crossing the Atlantic ocean from the Canary Islands to Antigua. Brothers and former Charlton students, Gary and Stuart Richards joined fellow crew members Stuart Shepherd and Martin Skehan for the Talisker Whisky Atlantic Challenge on 12 December 2021.

The Wrekin Rowers crew from Shropshire successfully finished their 40-day odyssey and raised more than £100,000 for charity. They were the 15th team to reach Antigua and the only team unlucky enough to be struck by a marlin causing their boat to take on water! But the enterprising crew used a lunch box to patch up the hole which was "as big as two fists put together".

They jointly thanked their supporters in Wellington after crossing the finishing line, "The people of Shropshire, especially Wellington, have been behind us the whole way," they said, "They got together in the square to sing our sea shanty. We're humbled by the support they've given us and we're just proud to have represented you on this journey."

Participants began their journey in La Gomera, the second smallest island in the Canaries. The men said they were pleased with their progress, covering over 70 miles on some days. They achieved their fundraising goal of  $\pounds100,000$  for Severn Hospice and the Royal National Institute of Blind People.

#### STEM 2021-22



STEM at Charlton this year has been busy. Fourteen students in Year 7 were invited to visit the National Space Centre in Leicester as part of the LCT's work with the Ogden Trust. They were able to visit the Planetarium and programme Rover vehicles to explore the surface of Mars.

Year 9 students have also had a busy year. We had runners up in the Sustainable Transport STEM challenge in the Autumn term, a visit from Hilary Hampton of Veolia to explain how the waste recycling process is trying to reduce the amount of waste that goes to landfill and during the last week of term, 24 students have taken part in the Shrewsbury College STEM Challenge. ## Cornerstone Enterprise Challenge

A selection of year 8 students participated in a pilot Cornerstone Enterprise Challenge created by the Wrekin Housing Trust. Andriane Usherwood-Brown, the lead for the Marches Hub, hosted the event alongside three employees from Wrekin who judged the overall presentations.

The students had three phases to work through:

Phase I: Redesign the canteen, to include furniture, entertainment and menus.

Phase 2: Recruitment – design adverts and job descriptions for a canteen manager, chef, serving staff and cleaning staff.

Phase 3: Interview and appoint people to fill the designated roles.

Working in small groups, the students used planning resources to ensure that they could budget the re-design and consider a range of furniture ideas through the catalogue given.



Once their time was up, each group presented their new designs, budget and recruitment with a detailed evaluation of why they had opted for the ideas they had.

The presentations were thorough and creative.

Winning overall were: Sapphire Lamb, Charlie Richards, Connie Eaves, Annalise Holding, Verity Stringer, Ava Lant and Peyton Collier. These students will be invited over to the Wrekin Housing Trust for a day to participate in a range of activities. Individual students selected for their exceptional contribution were: Paton Barclay, Sophie Thompson-Pallant and Kian Sherry who will also attend the activity day.

Our students have had a great time visiting Wildwood alpacas to engage in some alpaca therapy. During their visits we have seen their confidence increase and excellent teamwork and communication. ### Autism in Schools Project

This year we have been lucky enough to be part of the Autism in Schools project. It has certainly made us think about how we can make Charlton a more neurodiverse and inclusive school.

The project has had many elements to it:

- Termly Evaluations of the project itself and, more importantly, the sharing of good practice across Telford & Wrekin, Shropshire and schools from around the West Midlands area. It has also allowed for collaboration with a range of schools of varying sizes and demographic groups.
- PODS (Parents Opening Doors) has used Charlton as a base to connect with the parents and carers of our students who are neurodiverse. Several sessions have taken place over the last four months and these sessions have been invaluable. Parents and carers have been able to explore support for their children, find out how to gain a diagnosis and meet other parents who share experiences with children who may find school challenging.
- Staff attended webinars to see how to develop methods to make the school more 'autism friendly'. The whole cohort of teaching staff took part in an after school CPD session to investigate how Charlton could engage with this moving forward.
- During Autism Acceptance Week, Miss Knight allowed her classroom to be turned around. This was something that was discussed at one of the information webinars, and it was

a useful experiment to see how we can make it easier for our autistic students to enter a classroom once a lesson had started without causing them increased anxiety. They agreed that it made it so much easier for them and that they preferred making an unobtrusive entrance.

- PODS arranged for the Sensory Bus to visit Charlton at the end of lune and parents and carers were invited to join them through PODS. The Sensory Buss highlights the importance of being mindful of individuals who experience sensory difficulties. It encourages people to think about how individuals can be supported and allows for a broader understanding of how someone with sensory needs must adapt to an ever-changing environment, not only at school, but within society as a whole.
- Autism West Midlands came to Charlton to trial a 'Building Confidence' session for a small group of our students. This comprised six sessions over a six-week period and allowed students who struggle with their confidence to share their experiences at school. It provided reassurance and showed them how to build resilience and create strategies which they could utilise on a daily basis.
- Charlton has recently arranged for a Sensory Audit of the school to take place. Visitors came into School to experience what Charlton is like throughout the day with a particular focus upon all that is sensory. They looked at the general environment; noise

levels; appeal of displays around school; arrangement of classrooms including seating, tables, floor space, and lighting.

Finally, we recently received the great news that the project has been given more funding to enable it continue next year. We hope that Charlton will again be included so we can continue to develop everyone's understanding of best practice for our neurodiverse students. We especially hope to be involved in creating a more autism friendly school, leading the way within the Learning Trust, to become an advocate for good standard practice in this area.

#### Supporting Neurodiverse Students in Physical Education

Charlton's PE department are exploring how they can encourage more of our neurodiverse students to enjoy physical education at Charlton by joining clubs and experiencing sport in their own way.

Some of our students recently enjoyed a trip to Climbing Walls in Shrewsbury for an afternoon of rock climbing. The afternoon gave students a fun opportunity to use their communication and teambuilding skills, and to display resilience when faced with new challenges in their own way and at their own pace.

#### The Exotic Zoo Experience

Our SEN students enjoyed a visit from the Exotic Zoo recently. Twenty students participated in three sessions, which were crosscurricular and encouraged them to gain knowledge and understanding of the animals which visited and the topics presented: Session 1: The Rainforest Session 2: Habitats Session 3: Careers

Students were able to see the animals close up and experience holding them if they wanted to even members of staff came out of their comfort zone and joined in which helped to illustrate resilience when faced with a challenge. The whole experience was so well received by our students they want us to arrange a repeat visit!

#### Maths Club

This school year, the SEN Department launched their own Maths Club with the goal of bridging the gap and providing new, adaptive methods of learning for our SEN students. The club gave students the opportunity to explore maths in a more visual, tactile, and functional manner. Led by Ms Montgomery, invited students from years 7, 8, and 9 had the opportunity to practice maths-based life skills, including telling the time, calculating prices, and dealing with the four operations. Different strategies were used to communicate these concepts: students used Lego bricks to demonstrate different fractions; used real coins to count out change; and were given their own clocks with moveable hands for learning about analogue time. They even had the opportunity to play at being teacher themselves by picking a maths topic and teaching it to the rest of the students in the room. All in all, students gained valuable skills, knowledge, and confidence to tackle mathematical problems— and to see that maths can be fun!







#### Charltonbury Bake Off

As always, the Charlton Bake Off was well received this half term.

We challenged our students to get creative using the theme of the Jubilee for their cakes.

#### Young Leaders

Throughout the year, Charlton students have had many opportunities to lead at a variety of sports events.

For the Primary events to take place leaders are needed to help run them and we have been delighted to be able to support with our wonderful students.

Some of the opportunities include cricket, refereeing primary football games, archery, basketball, dance, tennis, commonwealth games festivals and quidditch.

We are very proud of how well our students presented themselves and represented Charlton School. We have had some lovely comments from the organisers and the primary school staff:

Well done to all the students who were nominated for sports awards and to those individuals and teams who have achieved so much over the year but who narrowly missed out.



















# Who are 'CATE' and what do we do?

- A small team within the local Council
- Committed to identifying and working with young people who are at risk of Child Sexual Exploitation
- We build positive and trusting relationships to increase awareness and reduce the risk of CSE
- Working in partnership with all relevant agencies; Police, Safeguarding, Education, Health Services, Social Services and Voluntary Sector
- Offer one to one support delivering the CATE intervention pack covering 6 themes: 'What is CSE?', 'Healthy Relationships', 'Understanding Grooming', 'Internet Safety', 'Sex and the law', 'Peer pressure'
- Supporting young people to access other services/agencies as appropriate

#### What is Child Sexual Exploitation?

"Child sexual exploitation is a form of sexual abuse in which a child or young person is exploited, coerced and/or manipulated into engaging in some form of sexual activity in return for something they need or desire and/or for the gain of a third person.

The 'something' received by the child can include both tangible items such as food, somewhere to stay, drugs, alcohol, cigarettes or money and more intangible 'rewards' such as perceived affection, protection or a sense of belonging. Fear of what might happen if they do not comply can also be a significant influencing factor.

Common to all these scenarios is an imbalance of power in favour of the abuser and some degree of coercion, intimidation, exploitation, violence and/or enticement of the child or young person." (DSCF 2009)

The abuse can be perpetrated by groups or individuals, and by adults or peers.


